

COVID-19 TESTING REQUIREMENTS FOR AIR TRAVELLERS GOING TO CANADA

All travellers 5 years of age and older flying to Canada from another country are required to provide proof of a pre-departure COVID-19 molecular test (e.g. a PCR or RT-LAMP test) within 72 hours of their scheduled time of departure to Canada*. Upon arrival in Canada, travellers will also be required to undergo a second COVID-19 test.

* In the case that the traveller has a connecting flight to Canada, the pre-departure test must be conducted within 72 hours of the scheduled departure time of the last direct flight to Canada.

Types of Tests Accepted

Tests must be performed using a COVID-19 molecular test, such as a polymerase chain reaction (PCR) or reverse transcription loop-mediated isothermal amplification (RT-LAMP) test. Other types of tests, such as antigen tests, will not be accepted.

Pre-Departure Testing Requirements

Travellers will be denied boarding if they are unable to provide printed or electronic proof of a:

- negative COVID-19 molecular test taken within 72 hours of their scheduled departure time
- positive COVID-19 molecular test taken between 15 and 90 days prior to departure

The test result must include the following information:

- Traveller's name and date of birth or age
- Name and civic address of the laboratory/clinic/facility that administered the test
- The date on which the test was conducted
- The method of test conducted (e.g. PCR or LAMP)
- The test result (such as "negative" or "not detected")

Presenting a questionable or fraudulent document could result in the traveller being denied boarding, and subject to fines of up to \$5,000 under the *Aeronautics Act*. This could also result in additional actions being levied against the traveller by a Public Health Quarantine officer upon arrival in Canada.

Arrival Testing Requirements

All travellers are required to undergo a COVID-19 molecular test upon arrival to Canada. While travellers are awaiting their test results, they must remain at a Government-approved accommodation for up to three nights. The costs associated to both the COVID-19 test and the stay will be at the traveller's expense.

Should the test result be negative, travellers will be able to leave but must quarantine at their final destination for the remainder of their 14-day quarantine (under significantly increased surveillance and enforcement). If the test result is positive, travellers will be required to immediately quarantine for the remainder of their 14-day quarantine in a federally designated quarantine facility that will be monitored by Public Health Officials.

Exceptions to Testing

There are only a limited number of exceptions where an individual is exempt from pre-departure and arrival testing. These include, but are not limited to:

- Children who are four years of age or younger;
- Air crew members or a person who seeks to enter Canada only to become such a crew member;
- Transiting travellers (not entering Canada through a border port);
- Emergency, law enforcement or border personnel; and
- Specific individuals or groups identified by Canada's Chief Public Health Officer or the Minister of Health.

Important: Anyone who receives a COVID-19 molecular test result and is authorized to enter Canada must still complete the full, mandatory 14-day quarantine, unless exempted under the *Quarantine Act*.

All travellers will have their quarantine plans reviewed by a government official and, if the plan is not suitable, the traveller will be required to quarantine in a federally designated quarantine facility. Travellers to Canada must use the ArriveCAN app or website and provide accurate contact information and their mandatory 14-day quarantine plan on or before entry.
